10 Fun Facts About Peru!


Peru is a beautiful country in Latin America. It's the third largest country in South America after Brazil and Argentina.







The capital of Peru is Lima, located on the Pacific Coast. It is also the largest city in the country.




Peru is home to a section of the Amazon rainforest. It covers nearly 60% of Peru's landscape, and about 5752 species of birds are endemic to the area.




The Andean condor bird is the largest flying bird in Peru and one of the largest in the world.












Peru has over 4000 types of potato varieties, and they come in different colors ranging from purple to pink to blue and red.
